


The cost of living: a North-South divide





Energy-related components are the main drivers


Annual inflation estimated composition





Reason 1: Nature and quality of the housing stock


Domestic-energy spending and dwelling efficiency

Vehicle-related spending and commuting




Share of commuters using private vehicle 2011 and driving 10km or more (%)

Estimated inflation and pre-inflation wages




Are wages keeping up with inflation?






Inflation is growing faster than wages in all cities

Mean real wages (April 2021 prices)




Government's support measures and policy implications





Government support package: welcome but not enough







What needs to change

Short-term: support immediate needs

- Increasing benefits now to bring them in line with inflation;
- Reintroducing the £20 uplift for Universal Credit;
- One-off payment for households living in dwellings below EPC band C.



What needs to change

Medium to long-term: reduce energy consumption and promote economic growth.

- Accelerate the retrofit agenda
- Encourage growth of the economy generally ('level up')
