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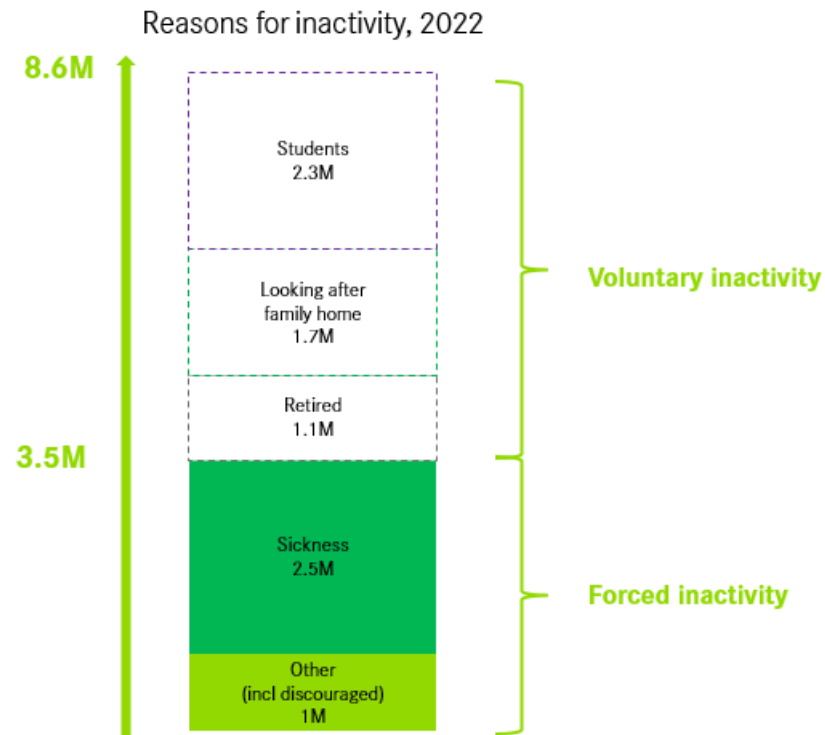


The national picture: an army of missing workers

Historically low unemployment

- A total of **1.2 million** people are unemployed
- The lowest it's been since the **1970s**

Hide high levels of 'forced inactivity'



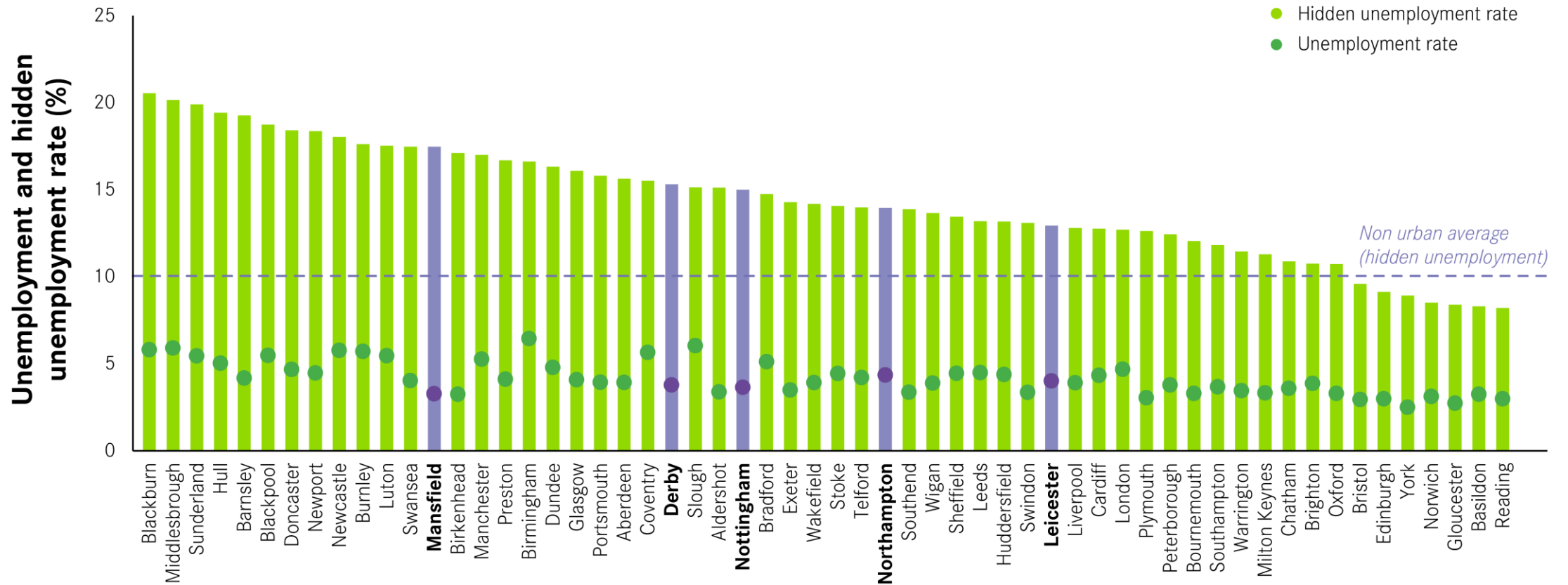

Resulting in high hidden unemployment

More than triples unemployment numbers to **4.7 million**

The picture across the East Midlands is relatively mixed, but many cities in the region have higher than average hidden unemployment

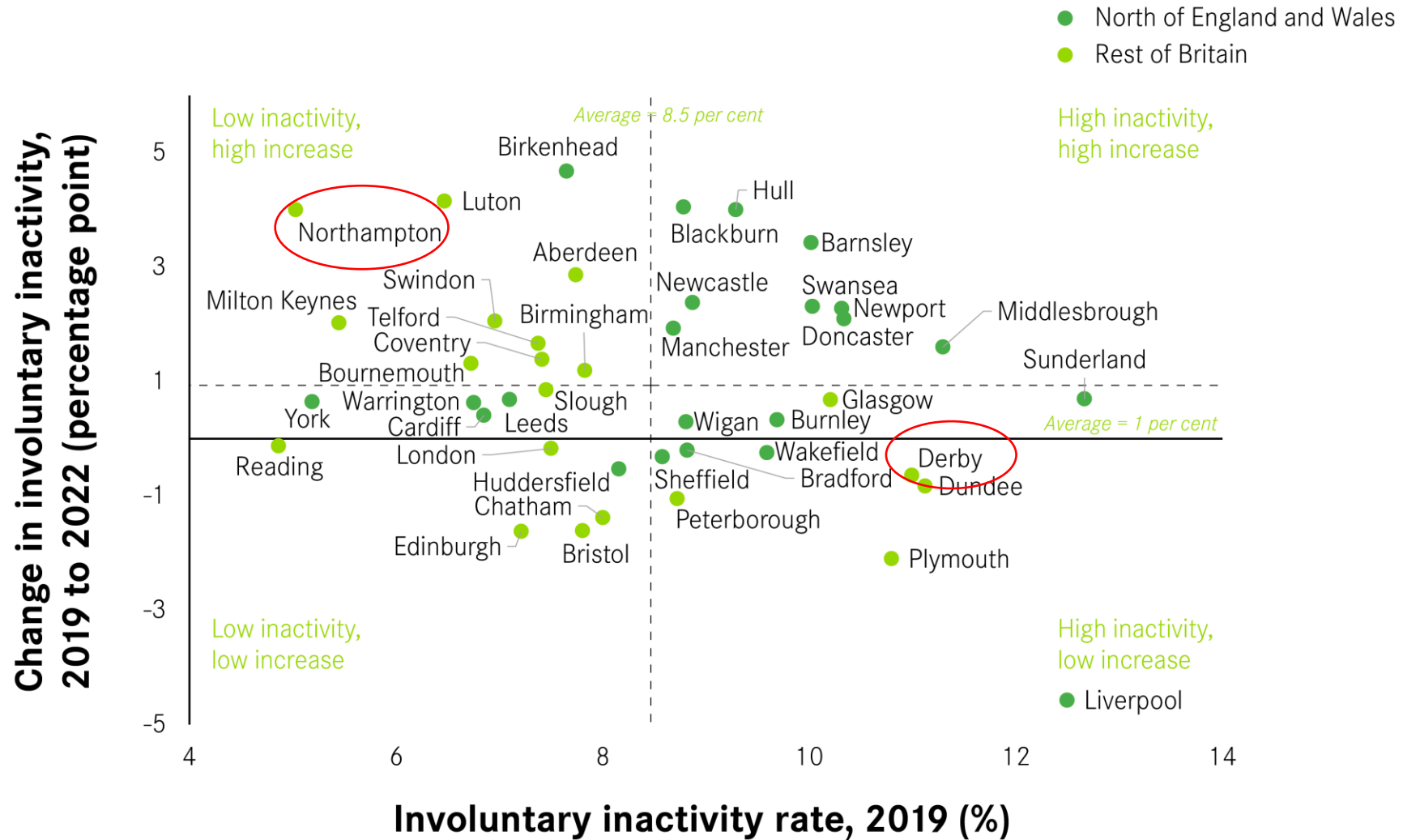
Unemployment and hidden unemployment, June 2022



In total, there are about 282,000 ‘involuntary inactive’ and 360,000 hidden unemployed in the North-West

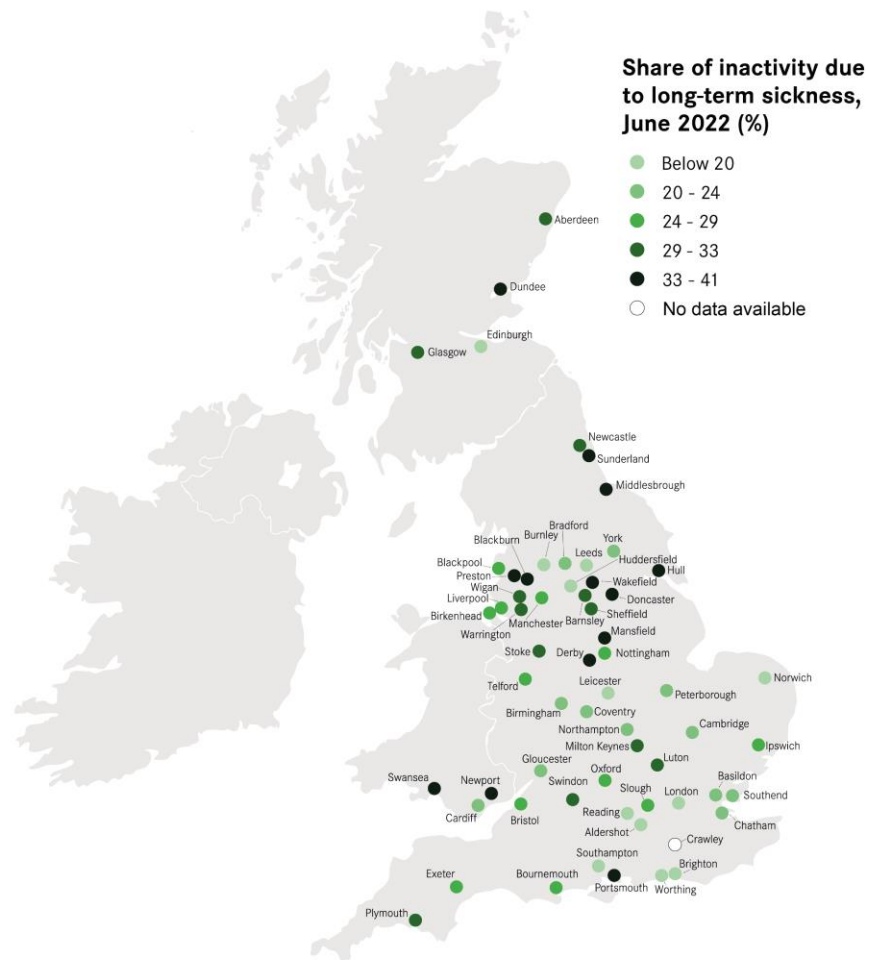
There isn't a clear geography to the increase in inactivity across the UK

Involuntary inactivity in 2019 and change to 2022



Two key factors help explain the spatial disparities in hidden unemployment rates

Poor health is a strong predictor of economic inactivity



The strength of the local economy also plays a role

36% of people in the East Midlands have **high-levels qualifications**, compared to **54%** in the South-East

10% of jobs are **private-knowledge services** against **19%** in the South-East
