








National Equivalent Vote


Vote share at local elections for major parties






Smaller swing to Labour than in 2022

Conservative to Labour swing in the 'National Equivalent Vote'











Labour did best in areas with fewest graduates, Conservatives did worst in areas with most


Vote share change by education status















Vote share for major parties since 1995
